

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Dr. Iker González-Allende University of Nebraska-Lincoln

Iker González-Allende is Leland and Dorothy Olson Professor of Modern Languages and Literatures, Professor of Hispanic Studies and affiliate of the Women's and Gender Studies Program at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He specializes in 20th-21st C. Spanish literatures and cultures, masculinities, gender and queer studies, exile and migration, Basque studies, the Spanish Civil War, and autobiographical writing. He has published six books: the monographs Hombres en movimiento: Masculinidades españolas en los exilios y emigraciones, 1939-1999 (Purdue University Press, 2018) and Líneas de fuego: Género y nación en la narrativa española durante la Guerra Civil (1936-1939) (Biblioteca Nueva, 2011), the edited volumes El mundo está en todas partes: La creación literaria de Bernardo Atxaga (Anthropos, 2018) and El exilio vasco: Estudios en homenaje al profesor José Ángel Ascunce Arrieta (Universidad de Deusto, 2016), and the editions of Pilar de Zubiaurre's works, titled Evocaciones: Artículos y diario (1909-1958) (Saturrarán, 2009) and Epistolario de Pilar de Zubiaurre (1906-1970) (Tamesis, 2014). He has also published more than 40 articles in books and academic journals such as Hispania, Bulletin of Spanish Studies, Anales de la Literatura Española Contemporánea, Hispanic Research Journal, Revista de Estudios Hispánicos, and Bulletin of Hispanic Studies.



Dr. Antje Muntendam Florida State University



Antje Muntendam (MA Leiden University, Ph.D. University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign) is currently an Assistant Professor at Florida State University. Before joining Florida State University in August 2014, she worked as an Assistant Professor at Middlebury College and Radboud University Nijmegen (the Netherlands). Her research focuses on the linguistic outcomes of bilingualism and language contact, both in production and comprehension. Specifically, she is interested in the nature and direction of cross-linguistic influence and in code-switching. She has worked on Quechua-Spanish bilingualism in Bolivia, Peru and Ecuador, Turkish-Dutch bilingualism in the Netherlands, and (more recently) Spanish-English bilingualism in the United States. Throughout her career, she has earned over \$200,000 in research grants from various organizations, published multiple articles in journals including Languages, International Journal of Bilingual Education and Bilingualism, Language, Cognition and Neuroscience, Journal of Phonetics, International Journal of Bilingualism and Bilingualism: Language and Cognition and contributed to books in both English and Spanish. With working knowledge of 9 languages, she has also presented at over 30 conferences and been invited to speak at numerous universities across the globe.
